
to *coordinate* resources and programs to *assist* tribes in achieving their goals in the prevention, intervention, and treatment of alcohol and substance abuse.



Federal Role...

Federal partners required to:

- **Cooperate** with the tribe in the development of a TAP to **coordinate** resources and programs (federal ones) relevant to alcohol and substance abuse prevention, intervention and treatment, and... TLOA reform
- Enter into an agreement with the tribe for the implementation of the TAP.




- TAP is a strategic plan for guiding specific, positive change among tribal members to address alcohol and substance misuse.
- Developing or revising a TAP promotes community recovery and healing.
- The TAP outlines what will be done, who will do it, and how success is defined.



Tribal Action Plan (TAP)

Your TAP and resolution are formal documents that will help OIASA inform federal partners and federal coordination efforts. *Also*, it will likely inform future grant solicitations and other resources.






- Tribal leadership passes and submits a resolution, along with a request for technical assistance to conduct strategic planning consultation
- OIASA will connect Tribe(s) to TA resources

- OIASA will track the plan to ensure that TA action is taken.
- Tribes may submit their Tribal Action/Strategic Plan to OIASA, who will maintain a record of all plans submitted.
